Swallowtail Class have worked very hard this week and had lots of fun! On Monday we went to Tescos at Gatwick, bought our cooking ingredients for the week and had a lovely snack in the café. In the afternoon we had lots of fun having a party to celebrate Freddie's birthday. We began learning about animal care for our first scouting badge and looked at how we can look after our pets. For our cooking session we enjoyed making cheese straws and on Thursday we enjoyed our weekly cycling session (even if it was a bit wet and windy!). It's been a very busy week!

Monarch Class have had a lovely week despite the inclement weather!! We began the week with a lovely trip to Sports Direct in Guildford, participating in an independent scavenger hunt searching for different sports equipment. This links directly to our topic of Famous Sports People, and we were able to explore and discuss some new sports. Our Kaleidoscope pupils ventured to ASDA Burgh Heath, where learners are beginning to get used to new and different shopping environments. Monarch Class have also completed some fantastic writing activities, looking at adjectives and how to make our writing more exciting. We are looking forward to the rest of our term and we're all hoping the weather begins to pick up; although it is good for the plants!

Admiral Class have enjoyed researching how we care for plants this week and how best to support them to grow. We have also been learning about the life cycle of a chicken and have started to create our display board by making chickens and sheep. For our community visit we went to Tesco to buy ingredients for our cooking session and made some muffins with strawberries. Admiral also went to Knights Garden Centre to buy cups to be able to grow cress. Watching Newsround encouraged lots of discussion in class around the time of year and why we have a leap year. We have also been learning about the difference between needs and wants.

Emperor Class had an excellent visit to the David Weir Gym. As they become more familiar with the gym equipment, they are able to work on their strength and stamina by setting small step targets for improvement. Of course, this needs to be balanced with some treats! They have been making wonderful strawberry cheesecakes to serve in Class Café . This lovely 'no-cook' recipe gave them the opportunity to use an electric blender and learn how to use such appliances safely. On the topic of 'Wildlife in Our School' we have been exploring the variety of creatures that live in our neighbourhood.
